PUBLIC HEARING, CITIZENS CORRESPONDENCE, PERSONAL APPEALS:

- Mr. Randy Panetta of Salem Township asked to speak to council regarding a police/Right to Know issue.
- ➤ Council President Hill granted him permission to speak. But cautioned that council would not address any ongoing police investigation.
- ▶ Mr. Panetta said that his right to know request was denied and answered untimely. He feels it is a conflict of interest for our Solicitor Attorney Frank Kepner to represent the borough on this issue because Kepner is his wife's attorney in a divorce and Attorney Kepner has access to documents that he himself has been denied. He said recently that Harrisburg has ordered that the documents be turned over to him. But Attorney Kepner has filed an appeal. He is requesting council to direct Attorney Kepner to withdraw the appeal and turn over the documents. He feels appeals are just an excuse for the attorneys to drain the well of money.
- ➤ Mayor Burke asked Mr. Panetta if he is insinuating that our chief of Police released information to Attorney Kepner improperly? Mr. Panetta said he is asking how

Attorney Kepner got information that he only got through discovery of police records. Attorney Kepner interrupted here and advised the Mayor that it was a complete fabrication. The Chief has turned over no records over to him (Kepner). Mr. Panetta stated that if that was so then he would ask for an investigation as to how Kepner's associate had the records at his last hearing.

- ➤ Council President Hill said that Mr. Panetta needs to let the judge decide this, let it go through the process. Let the appeal to the court decide it. We (the borough) are not going to get involved in it.
- ➤ Mr. Panetta asked to bring it to vote to pull the appeal. Council President said he will not do that.
- Mr. Panetta again asked the Council to take a vote to pull the appeal of the right to know and release the information.
- ➤ Councilman Travis Petty at this time made a motion to move to an Executive Session. This was seconded by Councilwoman Joanne Huntington. Council moved into an executive session at 7:30PM. Council emerged from executive session at 7:35PM.
- ➤ Council President Hill said council will defer to the opinion of the Borough Solicitor, Attorney Kepner. Attorney Kepner said it is in court and there is nothing else to say.
- Mr. Panetta asked if Attorney Kepner wanted to recuse himself. Hill said no. Panetta asked if council would like to ask him to recuse himself. Hill said no.

COMMITTEES:

MAYOR: Tim Burke; January 14 there was a big fire at Christos. The temperature was 18 degrees and the firemen did a fantastic job. The Salvation Army is running a Freeze Program, offering food and an overnight place to sleep when the temperature drops to freezing. They could use volunteers for the nights, food donations and blankets. They are helping 4-5 homeless people. January 25th there was a bank robbery. An invitation to attend the Berwick Youth Wrestling Awards Banquet this Friday. The Mayor has attended meeting at BIDA and BAJSA this past month. The Mayor is putting together a report for everyone on the overtime budget for the police department to try to help since we have a hire coming on. The comparison will be the strength of the force 10 years ago as compared to today. The Mayor gave a welcome to Mrs. Bobersky and 3 of our finest in the audience tonight (referring to 3 police officers in attendance).

ENGINEER: Quad 3 (NOT PRESENT AT MEETING)

SOLICITOR: Attorney Frank Kepner. Nothing to report.

<u>PERSONNEL</u>: Travis Petty-Joanne Huntington. Contracts on the agenda.

LEGAL AND FINANCE: Travis Petty-Andrew Shecktor. Meeting to discuss status of Borough and elections. That was cleared up. Looking at doing an audit to verify budget numbers and it was decided to start with our auditor first. Information was submitted to the Ordinance Committee regarding Drones in borough parks. And a request was made to the borough manager to possible get borough email accounts.

PARKS AND RECREATION: Jay Jarrett-Alvin Hill. Some of the bands that we had last year have broken up so we are in the process of booking news bands and contracts are going out.

EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT: Andrew Shecktor-Jay Jarrett-Greg Harkins. Symmetries have been updated.

STREETS, PARKS, & BUILDINGS: Joanne Huntington-Jim Meighan-Jack Kyttle. BAJSA has started the storm water project in the west end. DPW has been inspecting it daily for progress and any issues. Also being inspected are the on-going street cuts throughout the borough. DPW is communicating with the utilities companies to resolve the issues they have found. They have also been working on the street sign inventory and replacing signs. This process will continue until all our signs meet the requirements of the PUTCED. Winter maintenance on equipment continues. The Thompson Run sign and the Ber-Vaughn Park have been removed to be refurbished. They are waiting on the bullet proof glass to complete the door to the police station. DPW is working on a platform for the fountain center pump. The goal is to have the fountain up and running by April 1, 2016. The mild winter has kept the salt barn full, the business district has been cleared. Pot holes continue to filled with cold patch. And the Borough Manager has the specs and quotes for the 2016 F550 plow truck to replace the 2000 GMC 6500 plow truck. The recycling center is open Tuesdays from 1-5PM.

FIRE AND WATER: Andrew Shecktor-Jim Meighan-Fire Chief Bill Coolbaugh. The fire Chief has reached out to the company Chiefs regarding the new purchase order forms. They will try to get 2 estimates on things but sometimes only one company manufactures an item and they have to go with them. The Chief is working on a yearly report for council and that will be available soon. He is looking to hold a meeting on where the fire companies are going for the future. And last he has information on a grant for a drone for search and rescue that he is researching. No big call out recently.

Mr. Petty asked if this is going to be different from the other operation they have going on down there now behind Orange Street. Mr. Jarrett said that is not the CCHC that is Warrior Run Development, CCHC has nothing to do with that project. Councilmembers had a few more questions regarding screening of tenants. Mr. Jarrett said they will have background checks, criminal checks,

and credit checks done. Councilman Bower made a motion to send a letter of support, this was seconded by Councilman Jarrett. All ayes. Motion approved.
