PERSONAL APPEALS: Borough resident Bette Grey brought in evidence of KKK activity in the borough. Flyers in bags of rice were put on her and some neighbor's lawns in recent days. Council President Alvin Hill stated that all of Council would agree that hatred has no place in our community. Police Chief Strish said his department is aware of the recent flyers but there is not much an officer can do unless he sees it happen then we can engage them at that time. He asked that if residents call it in if they see it happening an officer will check it out.

Resident **Bridget Coolbaugh** questioned the status of the Defender audit. She was advised by Council President Alvin Hill and Borough Manager Debra Force that the books just came back from the accountant and will be turned over to the auditor. Mrs. Coolbaugh reminded council that there about \$11,500.00 that is owed to the state because they have no receipts. Council President Hill said Council is aware of that and if there is any inkling of miss-spending it will be turned over to the police department.

A borough resident asked who is responsible for street cuts that fail. There is a street cut that has sunk on Front Street at Scanlon. The resident was advised to contact Penn DOT as they issue the street cut permits on state owned roads.

### **NEW BUSINESS:**

1. Consider and take action on awarding engineering firm for demolition of properties on the HUD listing:

<u>Discussion</u>: Council President Hill said that they had 8 bids. The lowest was \$8,935.00 and the highest was \$58,800.00. SEDA-COG's Tyler Dombroski gave council the top 3. Councilman Travis Petty said Peters was the only firm that actually went out to the sight and to the meeting. But he was missing asbestos costs but he stated that at most it would be \$500.00 for each property for a total of \$25,000.00.

A motion was made by Councilman Larry Surkin to approve Peters Consultants with the asbestos costs of \$25,000.00. This was seconded by Councilman Jay Jarrett. All ayes, motion passes. 2. Consider and take action to waive Zoning fees (appx \$400.00) for the Stuart Tank Museum to be located at 309 N. Vine Street (the old Red Cross building).

Discussion: None.

Motion to approve was made by Councilman Larry Surkin Seconded by Councilman Andrew Shecktor. All ayes, motion passes.

3. Consider and take action to pave High School Avenue at an estimated cost of \$25,000.

<u>Discussion</u>: This would need to go out for bid. This is a high traffic area and may be combined with other streets for bid. This would be for half the alley. Appx 375 feet of paving.

Motion to approve Councilman Travis Petty and seconded by Councilwoman Joanne Huntington. All ayes, motion passes.

4. Consider and take action to pave the un-named alley behind Martz Technology at an estimated cost of \$20,000.- \$25,000.

<u>DISCUSSION</u>: Councilman Petty asked if this was discussed with the Borough's Solicitor. Attorney Kepner said it would be ok but we should have an agreement drawn up that states they are not getting any special ownership. They are paying for paving but nothing extra for the cost sharing. DPW Supervisor Jack Kyttle said this is a project his men could do. Council President Hill said we may get a better price with 2 projects. Put them both out for bid. Councilman Petty said to put out for 2 bids. One for just High School Ave and another for High School Ave and the un-named Alley.

Motion to approve was made by Councilman Surkin to put out a bid for High School Ave and another for High School and the alley. This was seconded by Councilman Jay Jarrett. All ayes, motion passes. Councilmen Shecktor and Petty abstained from the vote.

5. Consider and take action set the 2017 Dumpster Day for May  $13^{\rm th}$ .

<u>DISCUSSION</u>: We will need to put out bids for appx 15 dumpsters.

A motion was made by Councilman Larry Surkin and seconded by Councilwoman Joanne Huntington. All ayes, motion passes.

6. Consider and take action for the Berwick Area Marketing Committee to hold "Historic Berwick Food Festival" on Saturday May 13, 2017.

DISCUSSION: This event will be 11-6pm on Market Street. Councilman Jarrett said plans are in motion. He will have a full report next month.

A motion was made by Councilman Larry Surkin pursuant to permit approval from Penn DOT to close Market Street and bathroom facilities. This was seconded by Councilman Andrew Shecktor. All ayes, motion passes.

### ADDED ITEMS:

A. Consider and take action to advertise for the Grant Street Project.

DISCUSSION: Councilman Petty stated that this would be paid with CDBG money of apprx \$75,000.00 - \$100,000.00.
