PERSONAL APPEALS: Peggy Coggins of 719 Sycamore Street. Asking for

help to stop Tuzzi's Bakery from throwing out

bread for the rats, birds, and rodents in the neighborhood. Her and her brother are moving back from Mississippi and Texas to live in their old homestead. She stated they are killing rats right and left because Mrs. Tuzzi is throwing bread dough everywhere. She had picture she claims shows the bread on her roof and in the back yard. She stated Mrs. Tuzzi also cleans her oil drums out back in the alley and has grease running down the alley. She sent a letter to Greg Harkins in Codes and has contacted Leon Napolitano from the Dept of Agriculture Food Safety. Another citizen, Debra Bafile said she hired Steve Lynn to trap the rats and he said as long as the bread is being put out they won't stop coming. Council said they would look into it with the Borough Manager when she gets back from vacation.

Councilman Andrew Shecktor of 1308 Fairview Street stood to speak. He recused himself as a Councilman and wished to speak to Council as a resident. He stated his opinions are his personal opinions and not his opinions as a Councilman or as a member of the Council. He said he highly commends the Mayor, the Police Chief and the force for doing a fantastic job. He wanted to bring to light here an issue. His garage was broken into about 2 and a half years ago. Officers responded, took a report and advised him on how to secure his garage. Over this Memorial Day weekend, someone tried to break in again. What he wants to bring to the attention of Council and the police is that we need to look at how we resolve the bottom end, we are catching the top end; the ones that are selling the drugs but for him as a citizen it is more concerting when someone comes and takes his stuff and breaks into his house or car. It is akin to being raped. It left him with PTSD. We need to increase the conviction rate of petty thieves. Because to a citizen that is what counts. It doesn't matter if you are buying or selling drugs.
